Since that time, QUEST has focused on implementation of the assignment plan and the related issue of how Boston measures the quality of our schools; the District Superintendent search; facilities and long range capital plans; sufficient and equitable funding from the city and state; and accountability and equity in charter schools.

Chapter 70, Foundation Budget Review Commission

Monday, March 9, 4:30pm: **State Hearing** on the way foundation budgets are calculated. (The foundation budget is what the state believes is the minimum amount of money that must be spent to educate students. This amount is determined through statewide Chapter 70 laws. This law also determines how much of that money will come from the state and how much will come from the town in which the schools are located.)

- Join **QUEST**. We have meetings every two weeks and work on the budget and other issues related to quality and equity in our schools.
